

key priorities

for the Coming Year

The Lawrence Centre Staff and Student Advisory Council continue to prepare for the 2010-2011 term. Ambitious plans are in place for two Lawrence Centre workshops. The Water Innovation Forum will be held on January 23-24, 2011. Funding has been secured through the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, from Agriculture and Agri-food Canada's Growing Forward fund. A follow-up workshop on Transportation is also planned for Spring 2011 to build on the work of our 2008 workshop The Ontario - Québec Continental Gateway and Trade Corridor: Developing Competitive and Sustainable *Transportation Policy*. Consultations have begun with related government ministries and industries and we look forward to your guidance.

We are planning to host a financial-policy event similar to our *Redefining* the Canada-US Relationship in the Obama Era forum in 2009 and the G-20 Leaders' Symposium in 2010 and we welcome your ideas.

We continue to focus on website development, communications, and relevant public policy research in concert with our Chair, Thomas d'Aquino, and Lawrence Centre Advisory Council, in coordination with the Communications department at Ivey.

An effective dissemination strategy is an important part of the work we do at the Lawrence Centre. Meetings with representatives from various ministries related to our work in Climate Change, Finance, Food and Health, Green Energy, G-20 Issues, Transportation and Water are scheduled for the upcoming months.

Achievements and Events

October 2009 - November 2010

On October 5, 2010, the National Round Table on the Environment and the Economy (NRTEE), in collaboration with the Royal Canadian Geographical Society (RCGS), launched a special edition of Canadian Geographic on climate change, sponsored in part by the Lawrence National Centre. A reception, jointly hosted by the NRTEE and RCGS was held at the Canadian Museum of Nature in Ottawa. Keynote speakers included Governor General David Johnston. **Environment Minister Jim Prentice.** and Astronaut Bob Thirsk. Invited participants included University of Western Ontario President, Amit **Chakma and Dianne Cunningham as** a member of the NRTEE.



- On September 28, 2010, Dianne Cunningham, as Director of the Lawrence Centre, presented at an Ivey Alumni Association Ottawa Chapter event. Tiff Macklem, Senior Deputy Governor of the Bank of Canada was the keynote speaker and participants addressed the question "Who should lead the productivity revolution, government or industry?" The session was moderated by Bill Lawson; Associate Professor of Finance (retired) Sprott School of Business.
- Dianne Cunningham presented on "The Importance of High-speed Rail in Canada" at the Southwest Region Public Policy conference (August 2010) in London with more than 70 participants and local MPs and MPPs, where relevant and visionary public policy was explored.

As part of the dissemination plan for our April 2009 workshop Making Green Energy Happen: Policy and Priorities, their report entitled An Overview of

- Renewable Energy in Ontario, was submitted to the Ontario Centres of Excellence (OCE), one of the workshop sponsors.
- On April 13, 2010, Dianne Cunningham, as Director of the Lawrence Centre, attended a launch for The University of Western Ontario's new Canada-U.S. Institute in Washington, DC. The focus of the launch was the release of the Institute's first study entitled "Moving Closer or Drifting Apart? Assessing the State of Public Opinion on the U.S.-Canada Relationship," co-authored by Cameron Anderson and Laura Stephenson. Guests included representatives from the Canadian embassy and UWO alumni from the Washington, DC area.
- On April 12, 2010, Dianne
 Cunningham addressed the London
 Downtown Rotary Club at the
 London Convention Centre on the
 timely and important issue of highspeed rail and the Ontario-Quebec
 trade corridor. The corridor is a
 significant infrastructure priority for
 the City of London and Southwestern Ontario and will be the
 focus of our 2011 workshop.
- On April 7, 2010, Lawrence Centre staff participated in a joint University of Western Ontario, Faculty of Engineering and Trojan Technologies workshop on Water Research. Participants included John Carey, Director General of the Water Science and Technology Directorate, for Environment Canada, Engineering Dean, Adam Hrymak, and Linda Gowman from Trojan Technologies. As a member of the National Round Table on the Environment and the Economy, Dianne presented suggestions from their current research program on water issues as they relate to Canada's Natural Resources.

On March 29-30, 2010, Dianne **Cunningham and David Sparling,** Ivey Chair of Agri-Food Innovation and Regulation, co-hosted a workshop entitled Food and Health: Advancing the Policy Agenda. This cross-disciplinary workshop, with more than 80 leaders from government, business and academia, focused on how Canadians' health can be improved through new research, products, and communcations. Workshop recommendations are being presented to government and industry to identify where policies and strategies can be improved.

This is a timely issue as the next phase of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada's *Growing Forward* strategy is being negotiated for 2013.



■ The Lawrence National Centre partnered with The Norman Paterson School of International Affairs (NPSIA) and Thomas d'Aquino, President and CEO of Intercounsel Ltd. to host a Symposium entitled *The G-20 and the Prospects for Global Growth, Financial Reform, Trade Liberalisation, Climate Change Consensus and Energy Security.*



Speakers included Mark Carney (Governor of the Bank of Canada), Leonard Edwards (Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs and Sherpa to the Prime Minister of Canada), Tiff Macklem (in his former role as Associate Deputy Minister and G7 Deputy for Canada, Department of Finance, now Senior Deputy Governor, Bank of Canada), and our host, Donald Guloien (President and Chief Executive Officer, Manulife Financial Corporation). Ivey was well represented at the event. Associate Dean Rod White, Professor Craig Dunbar and Dianne Cunningham presented. Participants included Lawrence Centre board members Don Campbell, Jalynn Bennett, Blake Goldring, Ivey professors Jeffrey Gandz and Stephen Sapp, Lawrence Centre student advisory committee members and Tim Hodgson, Ivey Board member and Special Adviser to the Governor of the Bank of Canada.

- On March 14-16, 2010, the Lawrence Centre participated in the first Agricultural Biorefinery Innovation Network (ABIN) Conference organized by Franco Berruti and Chantal Gloor, Department of Engineering, UWO. This Conference was an integral part of achieving the goals ABIN set out when awarded \$8.7 million in funding provided through the Bioproducts Innovation Program (ABIP), from which we receive funding. More than 100 ABIN researchers from across Canada gathered at the Spencer Leadership Centre in London, Ontario to present their research and have the opportunity to engage in dialogue and exchange ideas.

- On March 11, 2010, the Lawrence Centre participated in the 4th Annual "Growing the Margins" Conference (March 8-12, 2010) in London, Ontario with more than 800 other participants. Dianne Cunningham participated on a panel with Bob Slater (National Round Table on the Environment and the Economy), Gord Surgeoner (President, AgriTechnology Commercialization Centre) and Don McCabe (Vice-President, Ontario Federation of Agriculture).
- On February 10, 2010, the Lawrence Centre participated in the Southwest Economic Alliance (SWEA) Economic Development Summit. The Summit discussed a report produced by Lawrence Centre MBA Senators. Adam Bortolussi and Rohan Belliappa, along with the Lawrence Centre staff and Student Advisory Council members, with the support of Ivey Professor Colette Southam. The report analyzed 25 economic development plans from 19 iurisdictions in southwestern Ontario and has been circulated widely to interested stakeholders in the region.
- On January 20, 2010, Dianne Cunningham, as Director of the Lawrence Centre, and UWO President Dr. Amit Chakma. attended the pre-budget consultation at the invitation of the Federal Minister of Finance Jim. Flaherty in Windsor. There was a great deal of interest in the recommendations from the Lawrence Centre's Making Green Energy Happen: Policy and Priorities (2009) workshop report and the Ontario-Quebec Continental Gateway and Trade Corridor: Developing Competitive and Sustainable Transportation (2008) workshop report.
- On January 18, 2010, representatives from the Lawrence Centre met with Federal Minister Tony Clement (Industry Canada) to advise on recommendations from both our *Making Green Energy Happen* workshop report and our *Transportation* workshop report. Minister Clement is one of the Ministers in support of our 2011 Transportation workshop to be held this Spring.

highlights Achievements and Events CONTINUED

- On January 14, 2010, the creation of a new Canada-U.S. Institute under the direction of Don Abelson, at The University of Western Ontario was announced. This is the first Canadian Institute dedicated solely to the study of the relationship between our two countries. The Institute encompasses three existing Western research centres and five faculties:
 - The Lawrence National Centre for Policy and Management (Richard Ivey School of Business)
 - The Canada-U.S. Law Institute (Faculty of Law)
 - The Centre for American Studies (Faculty of Social Science)
 - The faculties of Arts & Humanities, and Information & Media Studies

Research, policy and education are the goals of the Institute, with a focus on the political, economic, legal, cultural and historical dimensions of the Canada-U.S. relationship. Dianne Cunningham, on behalf of the Lawrence Centre, presented recommendations from our Making Green Energy Happen: Policy and Priorities (2009) workshop report at the Canadian Bioeconomy Innovation Network (CBIN) Networking meeting on January 11-12, 2010 in Ottawa. Representatives from provinces across Canada and Director Generals from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, Environment, Natural Resources Canada and Industry attended. The second day of the meeting was spent discussing and debating recommendations. This was a unique and valuable opportunity for the Lawrence Centre.




- On December 9, 2009, the Lawrence Centre presented recommendations from our *Making Green Energy Happen* workshop report to the City of London Board of Control. Students joined in this presentation and we received great support for the recommendations. A student representative was invited to be a member of the Mayor's Advisory Council on Sustainable Development and Energy.
- On November 13, 2009, Dianne Cunningham presented at the ADM Roundtable on Environment and Agriculture in Toronto. There were a number of high-level participants from OMAFRA, AAFC, OFA, Environment Canada, Conservation Ontario, Ducks Unlimited and University of Guelph. Parties identified a focus on water and climate change for the agriculture sector.

On October 29, 2009, the Lawrence Centre staff attended the workshop Climate Change as a Security Issue for Canada, as part of a collaborative Knowledge Synthesis project led by Dr. Gordon McBean, Policy Chair, Institute for Catastrophic Loss Reduction, and Professor, Department of Geography, The University of Western Ontario. This workshop brought together experts in government, business and academia to discuss the project chapters written on the food, water, health, population and international security implications of climate change that affect Canadians.





■ On October 20, 2009 the Lawrence Centre and Ivey hosted the Fourth Annual Thomas d'Aquino Lecture on Leadership, delivered by the Honourable John Manley, President of the CCCE. More than 400 students and professors attended John Manley's morning lecture at the Richard Ivey School of Business in London. An audience of more than 80 distinguished guests assembled for the evening lecture and dinner at the Toronto Club.





Melissa Harris is the Research and Project Manager and has been with the Lawrence Centre since March 2009. Prior to this, Melissa worked as a researcher for renowned climate scientist Gordon McBean, studying the security implications of climate change for Canadians. From 2004 to 2008 Melissa was an editor and office manager for the Canadian Poetry Press. Melissa has an HBA in Political Science and English and a Masters in

International Relations, with a focus on Global Environmental Policy from The University of Western Ontario. 
