
International Business: An Asia Pacific Perspective

Ivey professor Rick Robertson was invited by the National Accounting Institute in Beijing to conduct a 3-day intensive case method seminar in August. The advanced program received strong support from China's Ministry of Finance and was attended by senior officials from MOF, representatives from finance economics publishing houses, and more than 40 accounting practitioners and academics involved in teaching the newly accredited Masters of Public Accounting (MPAcc) degree program in China.

During the three days of discussion, Robertson elaborated on "The Why and the How of the Case Method". The seminar successfully demonstrated to the attendants how cases can be an effective tool in building knowledge in the accounting and finance areas.

This new publication by Andrew Delios and Paul Beamish provides a unique exploration of the topic of international business. It examines decisions relevant to managers as they internationalize and manage multinational firms in Asia Pacific. Jinjian Garment Factory is a large clothing manufacturer based in Shenzhen with distribution to Hong Kong and overseas. Although Shenzhen had become one of the most advanced garment manufacturing centres in the world, managers in this industry still had few effective ways of dealing with the collective and pace of work by the employees, of motivating workers, and of resolving the problem between seasonal production requirements and retention of skilled workers. However, the owner and managing director of the company must determine the reasons behind the deliberately slow pace of the workers, the pros and

cons of the piecework system and the methods he could adopt to motivate the workers effectively.
